The guide is organized in two ways – by borough and by type of experience or venue – and puts information about the diverse resources NYC has to offer at your fingertips.

 - → What can we find or use at home to make our own art (or structures, animals, etc.)?
- EXTEND children's learning by trying the following activities after your visit:
 - → **CREATE** an art gallery with children and **OBSERVE** each other's creations
 - → READ and TALK about art and creative expression.

48th Police Precinct Station

The 48th Police Precinct Station, designed in 1900 by Horgan & Slattery and completed in 1901, is an excellent example of Italian Renaissance Revival municipal architecture. The station survives as a prominent architectural landmark in the East Tremont section of the Bronx.

PARKS, RECREATION AND OUTDOOR VENUES

Plan Your Visit

- CHOOSE a park or other outdoor venue to visit.
- **PREPARE** for the outing:
 - → Visit the venue's website or call in advance to plan trip logistics.
 - → Choose one or two areas to focus on during your outing.
 - → Consider logistics like transportation, supervision, weather and meals.
 - → Inform families in advance about where you're going.
 - → Plan your route and be prepared to adjust based on children's needs.
 - → Ensure children are dressed properly.
 - → Pack a first aid kit.
- TALK about what to expect.
 - → What do they think they will see?
 - → Are there games or equipment they look forward to playing with?

While You're There

- ENCOURAGE children to use their SENSES
 - → ASK them to close their eyes and tell you what they hear or smell.
 - → TOUCH tree bark and other clean, safe objects you find and talk about texture, shape and size.
- ENCOURAGE children to LOOK for wildlife.
 - → LOOK under rocks and sticks for bugs, look up in the trees for birds.
 - → LOOK for animal tracks or for feathers that can tell the story of the animals that live in the area.

- **GO** on a scavenger hunt! Work together to create a list of items you may find and see outdoors.
- **COLLECT** leaves, rocks, sticks and other items to bring back with you.

- When you get home, ENCOURAGE REFLECTION about their experience and discoveries.
- · You might ask:
 - → What did you like the most about our time outside today?
 - → What did you find on our outing today?
- DISCUSS what they see and EXPAND on their observations using descriptive words.
- **EXTEND** their learning by trying the following activities with them after your outing:
 - → ASK children to share their observations and discoveries.
 - → OFFER books and FACILITATE discussions about the outdoors, living in a city, the animals they saw.
 - → MAKE art using the items you collected. Press flowers, glitter pinecones or draw part of your favorite park outdoor activity.

LIBRARIES

Plan Your Visit

- **CHOOSE** a library to visit.
- **PREPARE** for your visit:
 - → Visit the library's website or call the branch you will be visiting. Most library branches offer interactive story times for different age groups as well as many other free programs and activities.
 - → Consider visiting the library in advance to meet the children's librarian and learn the layout of the library.
- SIGN UP for your own library card if you don't already have one, and ask parents if their children have library cards before you go.
- PREPARE children for story times at the library by setting aside a daily Story Time when you read aloud to children. If there are older children in your care, you may want get them involved in reading aloud to children as well.

While You're There

- INTRODUCE the children to the children's librarian and encourage children to ask for help with finding books. Older children may ask for help with homework assignments or projects.
- DO a Picture Walk.
 - → Choose a book preferably with lots of illustrations - and "walk" through the book, one page at a time

- → OBSERVE what children NOTICE.
- → TALK about the characters and ask children to PREDICT what might happen, then
- → **READ** the book together.
- ENCOURAGE children to select one or two books (or more!) to bring home. You may also consider checking out books on tape or CD, DVD's and other available resources.

- When you get home, ENCOURAGE REFLECTION about their experience at the library.
- You might ask:
 - → What was your favorite part of the story you heard today?
 - → Why did you choose these books today?
- EXPLORE the following activities to continue promoting EARLY LITERACY and LANGUAGE development.
 - → **READ** to and with children
 - → OBSERVE how they INTERACT with books and stories
 - → **INVITE** children to create books of their own
 - → CREATE a quiet and comfortable Book Nook or area in your home with books and soft materials.



Plan Your Visit

- CHOOSE a library to visit.
- **PREPARE** for your visit:
 - → Visit the library's website or call the branch you will be visiting. Most library branches offer interactive story times for different age groups as well as many other free programs and activities.
 - → Consider visiting the library in advance to meet the children's librarian and learn the layout of the library.
- SIGN UP for your own library card if you don't already have one, and ask parents if their children have library cards before you go.
- PREPARE children for story times at the library by setting aside a daily Story Time when you read aloud to children. If there are older children in your care, you may want get them involved in reading aloud to children as well.

While You're There

- INTRODUCE the children to the children's librarian and encourage children to ask for help with finding books. Older children may ask for help with homework assignments or projects.
- **DO** a Picture Walk.
 - → Choose a book preferably with lots of illustrations - and "walk" through the book, one page at a time.

- → **OBSERVE** what children **NOTICE**.
- → TALK about the characters and ask children to PREDICT what might happen, then
- → READ the book together.
- ENCOURAGE children to select one or two books (or more!) to bring home.
 You may also consider checking out books on tape or CD, DVD's and other available resources.

- When you get home, ENCOURAGE REFLECTION about their experience at the library.
- You might ask:
 - → What was your favorite part of the story you heard today?
 - → Why did you choose these books today?
- EXPLORE the following activities to continue promoting EARLY LITERACY and LANGUAGE development.
 - → **READ** to and with children
 - → OBSERVE how they INTERACT with books and stories
 - → INVITE children to create books of their own.
 - → CREATE a quiet and comfortable Book Nook or area in your home with books and soft materials.



Situated in what may well be Manhattan's wildest, most history-laden nature preserve, the refurbished Indian Road Playground in Inwood Hill Park lends its bucolic surroundings a welcome kid-friendliness. Built with American Indian references in homage to the nearby road of the same name and the people who used it, the playground sports a wooden canoe that kids can sit in or fill with sand, a Native symbol-bearing tic-tac-toe game and a thoughtfully shaded circular sand pit, plus two climbing structures (one for tots, the other for older children) that resemble science-class atomic models.



While You're There

- ENCOURAGE children to use their SENSES.
 - → **ASK** them to close their eyes and tell you what they hear or smell.
 - → TOUCH tree bark and other clean, safe objects you find and talk about texture, shape and size.
- ENCOURAGE children to LOOK for wildlife
 - → **LOOK** under rocks and sticks for bugs, look up in the trees for birds.
 - → LOOK for animal tracks or for feathers that can tell the story of the animals that live in the area

- G0 on a scavenger hunt! Work together to create a list of items you may find and see outdoors.
- **COLLECT** leaves, rocks, sticks and other items to bring back with you.

- When you get home, ENCOURAGE REFLECTION about their experience and discoveries.
- · You might ask:
 - → What did you like the most about our time outside today?
 - → What did you find on our outing today?
- DISCUSS what they see and EXPAND on their observations using descriptive words.
- **EXTEND** their learning by trying the following activities with them after your outing:
 - → ASK children to share their observations and discoveries.
 - → OFFER books and FACILITATE discussions about the outdoors, living in a city, the animals they saw.
 - → MAKE art using the items you collected. Press flowers, glitter pinecones or draw part of your favorite park outdoor activity.

Founded in 1985, the Westervelt Community Garden is an important neighborhood resource. It is one of only a handful of community gardens on Staten Island. In the front of the garden, mature trees provide shade for local residents and visitors, while resourceful local gardeners grow vegetables and herbs – including peppers, eggplant, basil and parsley. A picnic table and grill in the back of the space make it an ideal location for barbeques and community gatherings.

Plan Your Visit

- CHOOSE a library to visit.
- PREPARE for your visit:
 - → Visit the library's website or call the branch you will be visiting. Most library branches offer interactive story times for different age groups as well as many other free programs and activities.
 - → Consider visiting the library in advance to meet the children's librarian and learn the layout of the library.
 - SIGN UP for your own library card if you don't already have one, and ask parents if their children have library cards before you go.
 - PREPARE children for story times at the library by setting aside a daily Story Time when you read aloud to children. If there are older children in your care, you may want get them involved in reading aloud to children as well

While You're There

- INTRODUCE the children to the children's librarian and encourage children to ask for help with finding books. Older children may ask for help with homework assignments or projects.
- DO a Picture Walk.
 - → Choose a book preferably with lots of illustrations - and "walk" through the book, one page at a time.

- → OBSERVE what children NOTICE.
- → TALK about the characters and ask children to PREDICT what might happen, then
- → **READ** the book together.
- ENCOURAGE children to select one or two books (or more!) to bring home.
 You may also consider checking out books on tape or CD, DVD's and other available resources.

- When you get home, ENCOURAGE REFLECTION about their experience at the library.
- · You might ask:
 - → What was your favorite part of the story you heard today?
 - → Why did you choose these books today?
- EXPLORE the following activities to continue promoting EARLY LITERACY and LANGUAGE development.
 - → **READ** to and with children
 - → **OBSERVE** how they **INTERACT** with books and stories
 - → INVITE children to create books of their own.
 - → CREATE a quiet and comfortable Book Nook or area in your home with books and soft materials.


